Studebaker factory by offsetting some of their pay and savings to pay for Studebaker advertising and marketing. The Studebaker factory responded to their entering receivership with an aggressive new marketing campaign promoting Studebakers as "Automatic Automobiles" containing "12 mechanical brains" that made driving so easy all an owner had to do was steer. The ad's proclaimed Studebakers were so advanced that "They're the pattern cars for all cars of the future!" By letting buyers know Studebakers were so advanced, they wouldn't worry about receivership making obsolete their Studebaker purchase. The ad notes these Studebakers are so advanced they almost "drive themselves and think for you." So what are these mechanical brains? Well, the ad only lists three so here they are. Power Brakes, automatic choke, and automatic starting. Univac and Big Blue have no competition to worry about here when it comes to artificial intelligence. The Studebaker factory was now back placing ads in daily newspapers and making sure all its dealers in a given market like the greater St. Louis area were once again mentioned at the bottom of each ad with their addresses.

Before receivership Erskine had put most of Studebaker's newspaper ad resources behind promoting the low priced, entry level, hopefully high volume, and low margin Rockne car. Now it was obvious the factory was making a complete 180 degree change and giving the senior Studebaker lines the biggest portion of their promotion dollar. This is likely because in just 2 short months, July 1933, Studebaker would be pulling the plug on the Rockne line completely. The car wasn't competitive in price and feature wise and it just wasn't selling. Despite Studebaker press releases that insisted deliveries of Rockne's often rose from one quarter to another. Even when the Studebaker factory dumped Rockne's onto dealers at below factory cost, the dealers still had trouble selling them. Reportedly there was even sales resistance to the name although the car had so

Arthur R. Lindburg has expanded his activities by acquiring the San Francisco franchise for Studebaker. Rockne, Pierce Arrow Motor Cars and S. P. A. trucks. Last week he opened a new store in St. Louis at 3506 North Grand boulevard, near Hebert street.

Lindburg now becomes one of the largest distributors of these products. He owns and operates in St. Louis, Arthur R. Lindburg, Inc., distributors of Studebaker and Rockne cars for Eastern Missouri and Southern Illinois; and the Arthur R. Lindburg Co. and is distributor of the S. P. A. line of trucks, besides owning a large local finance company

For several years Lindburg has owned the Studebaker-Rockne Dis-tributing Company at Fresno, Cal.

The addition of the San Francisco distributership makes his California organization one of the largest automobile companies on the West Coast. The Lindburg interests now have more than 300 persons in their employ

According to Lindburg, the proximity of St. Louis to the Stude-baker-Rockne plant at South Bend. Ind., and the Westinghouse plant at Mansfield, Ohio, will naturally make St. Louis the general headquarters for his business. He will, however make frequent trips to the West Coast

There is no doubt in my mind that this country has not only turned the corner toward better business, but is well on the way toward prosperity." Lindburg said. At the same time I am convinced that the Studebaker Corporation and its subsidiaries are fundamentally sound, as is proven by their remarkable record since they have been operating under a receiver-ship. many things going against it that it's probably unfair to focus too much on just that.

As we've already pointed out the 1939 Studebaker Champion was a success so Studebaker itself proved there was a winning business plan an independent automaker could use to make a low cost, compact, car profitably. Studebaker just forgot/ abandoned it after they brought out the original Champion.

What is amazing so far is just how stable the greater St. Louis Studebaker dealer network has been. I mean they've even managed to add Dierl Motor Sales, 1335 South 7th Boulevard, St. Louis, MO., to sell Rockne only. The worst part of the Great Depression, then the Studebaker factory entering receivership with no guarantee it will come out and Studebaker adds a Rockne sales outlet in St. Louis. Truth is stranger than fiction sometimes and this is one of those occasions.

Well we already know the Rockne is gone in just 2 months so Dierl Motors will either have to be given a Studebaker franchise to replace the Rockne franchise it will lose or just be cut off completely from Studebaker. As for the other Studebaker Dealers? We'll just have to sit back and watch. This will be brutal to watch, I'm sure.
